About the region

The Limestone Coast covers the south-eastern corner of South Australia and is equal distance to both Melbourne and Adelaide. We encompass the seven Local Government areas of the City of Mount Gambier; District Councils of Grant, Kingston SE, Robe, and Tatiara; and the Naracoorte Lucindale and Wattle Range Councils. The Limestone Coast supports a population of 67,371 people (ABS Estimated Resident Population 2021) and covers an area of 21,329 square kilometers.

Our region is home to a broad range of industry sectors making for a robust, vibrant, and expanding business community. The economy capitalises on the region's abundant natural resources and has come from traditional agriculture-based activities which have expanded to include forestry, manufacturing, tourism, engineering, transport, retail, health, education, and service industries.

- Engaged with Telstra on a whole of region proposal to address priority connectivity blackspots that informed the future funding for 26 new mobile towers across the Limestone Coast.
- RDALC finalised the CSIRO TraNSIT 2.0 business case for reinstatement of the Mount Gambier to Heywood rail line.
- Successfully advocated for inclusion of land for the Glenburnie Intermodal in the District Council of Grant Strategic Land Use Plan.
- Participated in the Green Triangle Freight Action Plan including advocating for priority road upgrades for better movement across the region and border.
- Advocated for road infrastructure, bridge upgrades, Dukes Highway duplication, and other regional priorities.



Human Capital

- RDALC maintains a Job Board, collecting data and trends to advocate for support to businesses to identify and retain staff in the region and inform government policy.
- The Regional Workforce Project Key Statistics:
 - 21 skilled workers from outside the Limestone Coast registered with RDALC.
 - 3 skilled workers were assisted to take up employment and move to the region.
 - Hosted 2 regional migration information sessions.
 - 5,947 regional vacancies were collated and advertised on our website.
 - Facebook post reach for 'Job of The Week' promotions was 152,191.
- Small business support was provided to 223 small and family businesses across the Limestone Coast.
- Employer of Choice program was implemented, including;
 - Region Ready delivered 6 Specialist Seminars for local businesses.
 - 6 columns published in the SE Voice with a potential reach of 18,000 subscribers.
 - 28 business owners, operators, and employers attended a full day workshop in Mount Gambier.
- Collaboration with StudyAdelaide key statistics;
 - 42 skilled students and graduates were linked to regional employment opportunities.
 - A student tour was hosted through the region including a mini expo at Mount Gambier's UNI SA.

Investment

- Our Investment Pipeline highlights projects both public and private across the Limestone Coast. In June 2023, 208 projects were included, with a combined value of more than \$2.83 billion.
- As part of maintaining the Investment Pipeline, we have been able to identify barriers to construction, including access to adequate power, water, sewerage services, investment and workforce. These barriers were advised to State and Federal governments as part of our regional advocacy.
- Information on the Accelerate Adoption of Wood Processing Innovation was provided to each of the eligible sawmills in the Limestone Coast. RDALC assisted with 3 successful applications.
- Grant support was provided to 231 organisations from across the Limestone Coast.
- We assisted in attracting more than \$13 million for the region in the first half of 2023, including \$560,000 towards the Forestry Skills Hub.

Environment

- 1,000 stakeholders were provided information on the Energy Efficiency Grants for Small and Medium Enterprises.
- The Circular Economy Opportunities Limestone Coast report was launched in November 2022 and promoted throughout the year.
- We participated in the South Australian Government Hydrogen and Renewable Energy Act consultation process.
- A submission and presentation were made to the Natural Resources Committee of South Australian Parliament Inquiry into Biochar.



Organisational

- Regional Intelligence and Employee Growth
 - Active participation in an online workshop on Growing Regions Program design.
 - Active participation in South Australian Government Regional Land Use Planning process for Limestone Coast.
 - Participation in State and Local Government Economic Partnership Forum.
 - Submission was made to the Migration Review and RDALC was quoted in the Review of the Migration System Final Report.
 - Our CEO participated in the RDSA delegation to Canberra which included meetings with senior Ministers and Departments.
 - Our CEO was appointed to the Steering Committee to progress the Education and Training Precinct.
- 51 editions of The Weekly were published with over 1,650 people subscribed.





South Australian Regional Development Australia associations have a unique tripartite funding model. This means we are funded by and accountable to all three levels of the Australian Government.

The Commonwealth Government funds Regional Development Australia Limestone Coast as part of the national structure of 53 regions. Ech region is given a base amount, which for our region is around 1/3 of our total revenue.

The South Australian Government provides a base level funding agreement from the Minister for Regions, as well as project funding from various departments depending on community priorities. In 2022-23 this accounted for almost 56% of our funding.

The Limestone Coast Local Government Association provides funding focused at providing benefit to our regions unique demographic and for small business support. in 2022-23 this contributed 13% of our total income.
